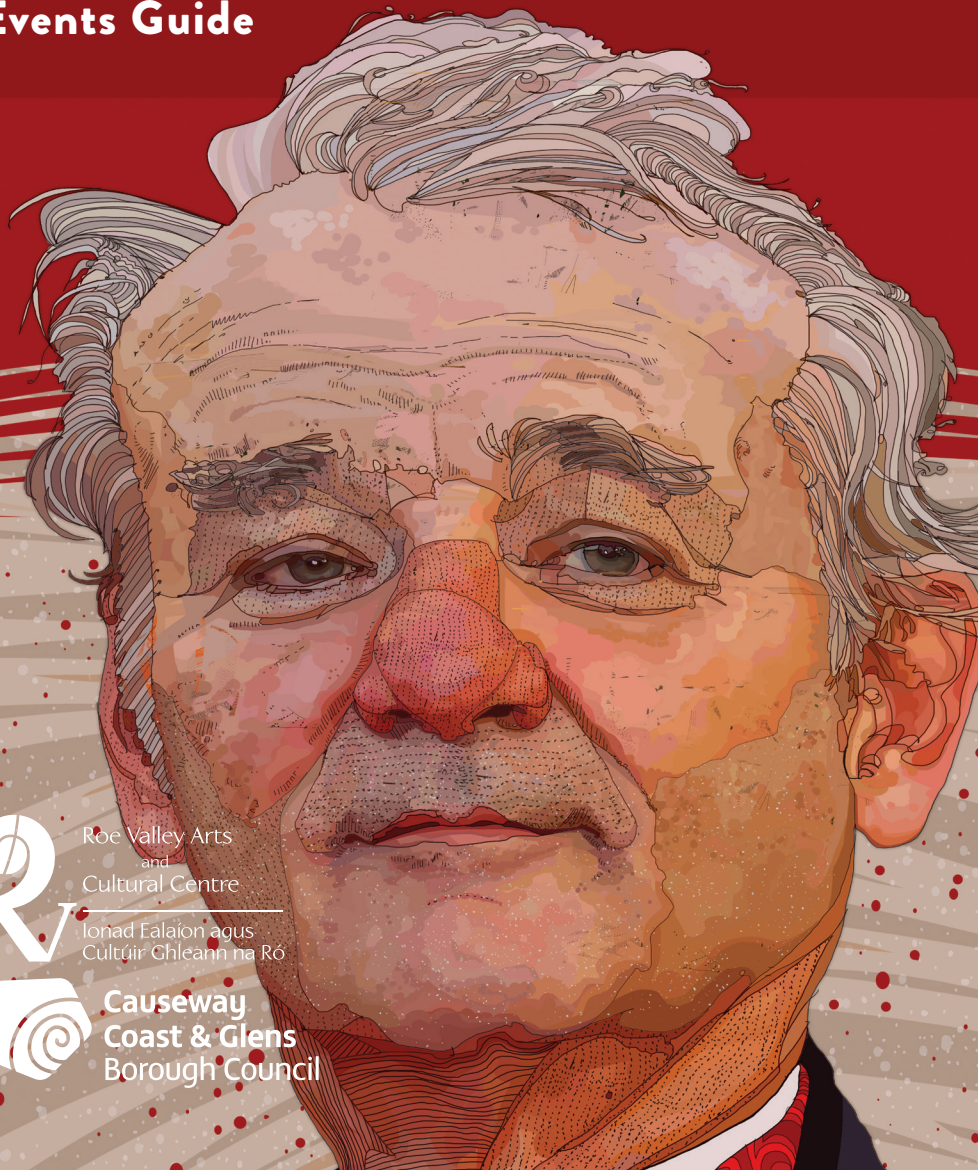

Welcome to our January – March 2018 Events Guide!

An award-winning arts and conference facility situated at the heart of Limavady town, we provide a wonderful arts and heritage events programme throughout the year, including theatre, music, visual arts, crafts, local histories, talks, film, creative learning and outreach activities for all.

Our spaces

Our spaces include the Keady, Brighter and Ritter Galleries; the 221 seater Danny Boy Auditorium; the O'Hampsey Studio; the Ross-McCurry and Keenaught Suite boardrooms; the Benbradagh and Binevenagh arts and crafts workshop rooms; Drumceatt Square, an external performance space, and community square.

Our venue also features a Visitor Information Centre, gift shop and family zone with a children's reading area. We are also home to Limavady Museum where visitors can explore the history of Limavady town and surrounding area through a series of temporary exhibitions. An appointment can be made with Museum Services to explore other parts of the accredited collection.

All of the above spaces (with the exception of the galleries) are available for hire for a wide range of events. From a small meeting to performances in the auditorium to a large conference with multiple break-out spaces, we accommodate external bookings from community/voluntary, statutory organisations and private hire throughout the year. Access

The Roe Valley Arts and Cultural Centre has been designed with accessibility in mind. We are keen to continue to improve our services, so that we can make your visit as seamless as possible, please do make us aware of your needs at the time of booking so that we can plan ahead for our next event.

Parking is available on the main street directly outside our building however normal on-street parking restrictions apply. Blue-badge holders can access parking to the rear of the venue or on-street parking free of charge. Other car parking is available within walking distance of the venue; please enquire at our box office.

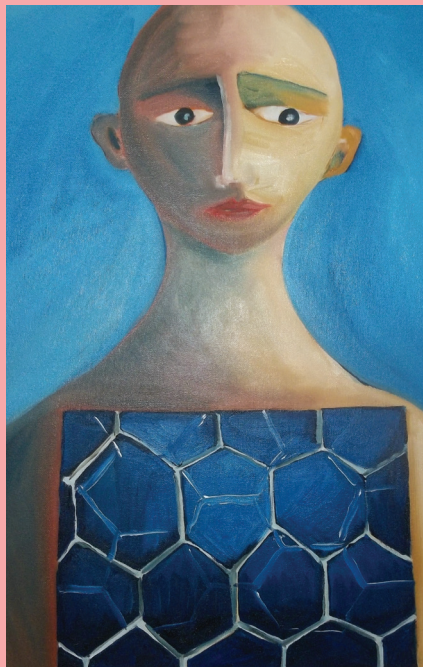

Amanda produces work that mixes the seen and unseen, the real and the imaginary. This work delves deep in to the subconscious and the soul. As the artist says "I like to relate my subconscious with the hand that I sketch, paint or sculpt, most of the time not knowing what I am going to produce."

Born in 1970s in Derry city, Amanda attended Northwest Regional College and later Wimbledon School of Art and Bath College of Higher Education, where she studied for her fine art degree. Her artistic journey has led to working as an illustrator with Guildhall Press; photography technician; craft work in potteries; supporting creative workshops; assisting with mental health charities and her own studio work at Bishop Street studios where she is currently based.

18 January – 24 February

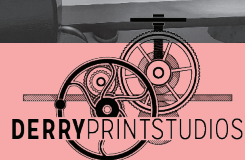

World Illustration Awards 2017

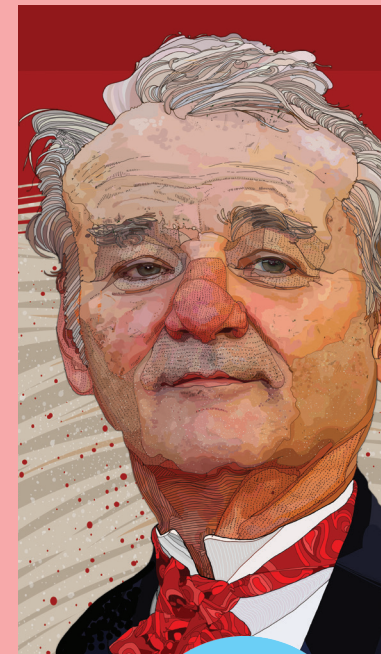

Twelve Holocaust survivors recall events in this sobering World War Two documentary. The film combines survivor testimony, archive footage and photography to highlight the atrocities committed, with interviewees providing personalised accounts of their experiences. Some survived the death camps through hiding, others as part of a resistance group, and accounts are given of the assistance provided by Oskar Schindler. As well as the events themselves, the documentary also looks at how they have affected the lives of the subjects in the decades since.

Destination Unknown is a difficult but necessary insight into the Holocaust told by those that both witnessed and survived it.

Son of Saul

Winner of the 2016 Best Foreign Language Film Oscar and Golden Globe, 'Son of Saul' is Hungarian director László Nemes' blistering debut feature; a courageous and unflinching reimagining of the Holocaust drama.

Saul Ausländer is a member of the Sonderkommando, the Jewish prisoners forced to assist in the machinery of the Nazi concentration camps. While at work, he discovers the body of a boy he recognises as his son. As the Sonderkommando plan a rebellion, Saul vows to carry out an impossible task: to save the child's body from the flames and

to find a rabbi to recite the mourner's Kaddish and offer the boy a proper burial.

Anchored by a riveting and intensely brave performance from newcomer Géza Röhrig, 'Son of Saul' is a remarkable exploration of one of humanity's darkest moments. Visceral, gripping and immensely powerful, it is one of the boldest and most remarkable debut features in recent memory and is already being heralded as a masterpiece of world cinema.

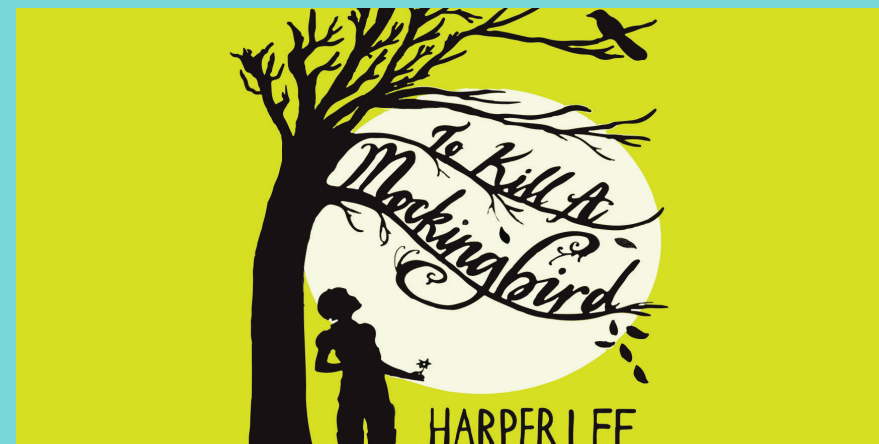
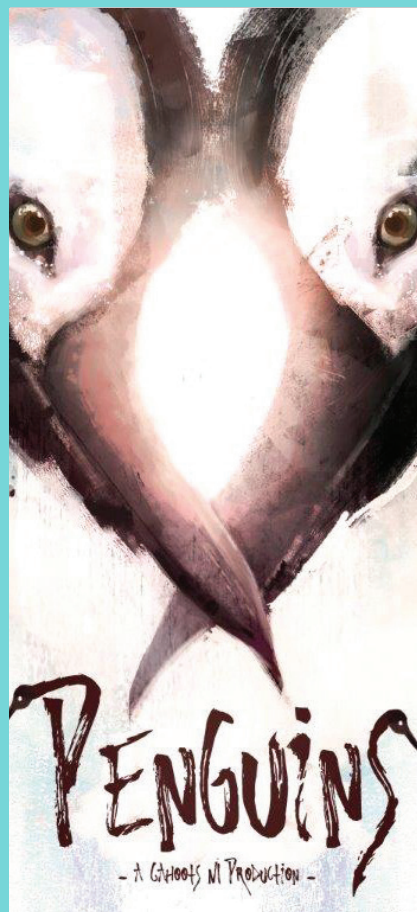

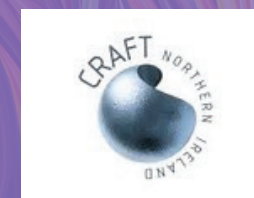
